



Fernweh - Travelling Curator Project 30 April to 4 May 2013

Fernweh (from German) - literally translated means 'farsickness' or an 'ache for the distance'. Some dictionaries also translate it into 'wanderlust' or 'itchy feet'. Antonyms: Heimweh (homesickness)

Fernweh was an international travelling-curator project investigating notions of travel and hospitality within community and socially engaged art. A group of eight established and emerging curators with a keen interest in socially engaged arts were sent by train on a journey from Huntly via Lumsden, Helmsdale and Inverness to Skye and back again. On their journey they investigated notions of travel, hospitality and social engagement through a hosting, visiting and travelling programme. The participating curators were:

Claudia Zeiske, Deveron Arts, Scotland/Germany and Gayle Meikle, independent curator, Glasgow, Scotland.

At each hosting place the visitors discussed one of the following topics together with members of the communities:

Collaboration + Dialogue at SSW in Lumsden Community + Place at Timespan in Helmsdale Travel + Remoteness at ATLAS on Isle of Skye Urban + Rural with IOTA in Inverness and finally Hospitality + Visiting at Deveron Arts in Huntly.

In the course of the final day the participants - travellers, community members, curators, artists - discussed different sides, characteristics and implications of hospitality and travelling, starting from Deveron Arts' hospitality programme. The second part of the day offered a "lunch walk" by visiting a number of Town Collection hosts like the Gordon Arms Hotel, the Bookshop, the Carpet

Centre and the Whisky Shop, while trying some Huntly Signature Menu appetisers. In the afternoon the travelling curators reviewed their experiences, discussions and findings from the journey at the Empty Shop. Day and journey were completed with a community Ceilidh in the Tin Hut.

Caravan Gallery: Huntly *Pride of Place* 15 July -15 August 2013

This summer the Caravan Gallery is coming to Huntly. Led by the artists Jan Williams and Chris Teasdale, the Caravan Gallery is not only a mobile exhibition venue, but also a visual arts project, involving the local communities of every place that it stops.

Their work exposes ordinary and extraordinary details of the everyday life and they create exhibitions with the help of local communities on the basis of their findings. This way they bring people from all walks of life together, who would not normally meet, and get them to talk and interact. By investigating places aside from the promises of tourist information brochures and trying to capture



the sense of a place, they are able to discover things that local people overlook or have never even seen, revealing either typical characteristics or random features of a place. They explore the local identity without whitewashing or skipping facts and gather true knowledge of local leisure, activities, lifestyle and culture. The outcomes of their observations and their interaction with local communities result in establishing a relationship with a place and its people.

Depending on the project, topic and location, Jan and Chris put on exhibitions in their caravan, national and international galleries, empty shops, village halls or every other suitable place in the UK or abroad.

In Huntly, the Caravan Gallery will set up an alternative tourist information office on the Square, applying their "Pride of Place"-methodology to the town. Townfolks and visitors are invited to take part in exploring the local identity and the sense of place of Huntly and its Room to Roam motto, by contributing their observations, creations and anecdotes. ch this space! Walking — Walking — Walking

SOW MARAHAN

Following on from the first Slow Marathon in 2012, initiated by the Ethiopian artist Mihret Kebede, Deveron Arts organised a second Slow Marathon on Saturday 20 April. This now annual event also served as a launch for Deveron Arts' brand new initiative, the Walking Institute. The weekend of events was opened by nature writer Jim Crumley and ended on Sunday with an animated discussion on John Muir entitled *Nature at Home* with speakers, Mike Daniels of John Muir Trust, artists Gill Russell and Penny Weir and renowned bird of prey expert Roy Dennis.

With fantastic weather conditions, the Slow Marathon walkers took a 26 mile route through the Upper Cabrach area along the River Deveron and over the Clashmach to Huntly. Peppered with entertainment and refreshment stops, the route followed some of an original Hielan' Way, crossing largely unexplored countryside.

Piper Steve Brown marked the start of the event which was supported by local businesses, organisations and volunteers providing refreshments; from the Grouse Inn and the Acom Centre, tasty cinnamon buns at the Mill of Lynebain, a shortbread stop donated by Deans of Huntly at Bailliesward, a pop-up cafe with all donations going to the John Muir Trust at Cairnagatt and a well welcomed whisky stop sponsored by Cost Cutters featured at the top of Clashmach. Once back at the Brander Building participants were treated to further refreshments, stretching, foot spas and their well deserved certificates for completing the Slow Marathon.

In contrast to most sporting events, the winner of the Slow Marathon was the slowest of the slowest of them all: Sophie Hope. Sophie's finishing time was 12 hours and 45 minutes whilst the loser,



Harris Williamson (aged 15) finished 4 hours before. "I can't believe I did it!" said Sophie, "it took me 12 hours and I won a prize - the slowest walker!"

Slow Walker Valerie Milne said "really fantastic, and I was absolutely knocked out by the hospitality of all the people on route who made it a really wonderful and enjoyable day".

Deveron Arts has a keen interest in the concept and activity of walking. Our ambition is to set up a unique and new walking appreciation initiative, which will become a centre of excellence for the walking & arts discourse. This will include both research and physical activities produced through artist-led projects, taking place both in Huntly and beyond.

Lost Lines

Stuart McAdam traces closed railway branch lines in the North East June - August 2013

Marking 50 years since Dr. Beeching decimated the British railway system, artist Stuart McAdam is to trace the remains of branch lines closed as a consequence of "The Reshaping of British Railways" report. Commissioned by the Deveron Arts' Walking Institute initiative, Stuart's project, 'Lines Lost', will see him reawaken routes that have been subsumed into the landscape, remain as ghostly traces of lines that once linked communities or have been given a new purpose in the last 50 years.



The North of Scotland was one of the areas most affected by the Beeching cuts; closing many stations on the Aberdeen Inverness route and stopping train routes such as Huntly to Banff and Portsoy, Banff - Tillynaught, Fraserburgh - St Combs, Elgin - Lossiemouth, Aberdeen - Ballater and Fraserburgh, Maud - Peterhead and Aviemore - Elgin via Inverness. Many of these lines that crossed the county have never been replaced by other forms of public transport making journeys difficult and adding hours to travel time for those without access to private cars - people have to travel south to Aberdeen or north to Elgin to get connections and often have long waits between buses. This summer McAdam will walk all of these routes starting with those from Huntly to Banff and Portsoy. He will interrogate the historical and contemporary resonances of these routes through documented walks. "Remnants of most of the lines still exist within the landscape and I hope to reawaken them into public consciousness", says McAdam, who has explored journeys, boundaries and slow travel in a range of artworks. "As we mark the 50th anniversary of the publication of the Beeching report, this is a fitting time to consider the impact that the cuts had on the development and decline of the many towns and villages that lay along the historic routes, which were often life lines for outlying communities."

Stuart's Lost Lines project will retrace routes that were once vital in linking dispersed communities in rural areas. It will encourage us all to think about the historical, cultural and social impacts of the report that changed the lives of communities across the UK.

Celia - Yunior talking about life and friendships in Cuba, Huntly & everywhere else

Celia and Yunior, your project faceloop is about friendships here in Huntly playing on the popular social network facebook. How did the idea come about?

When we first came here in April, we didn't know anybody in town, besides the people from Deveron Arts. So we thought about combining the act of walking with visiting and meeting people and, thereby, getting to know the community. We wanted to meet people directly, face-to-face.

In every project we do, we try to find an unusual/different way to deal with the prevailing administrative mechanisms. In this case, we regard facebook as the mechanism which administers social relations and contacts among people. Facebook has its own way to "suggest" friends by using probabilities and numbers, profiles information and common denominators - losing the best part of meeting someone, being able look them in the eye; see their reactions, physically and emotionally speaking.

Do you use facebook at home in Cuba?

Internet and facebook are only available at very few places in Cuba, like for example at the University. But even at these places it works very, very slowly. So, the internet doesn't play such an important role there as here in Europe. You cannot really use it as a means of communication and it is therefore not that popular, as you tend to just go over to people's homes and meet them. You have mainly face-to-face-relationships rather than online-relationships. But if you want to get in touch with friends/people abroad you have to maintain an online-relationship. That's the only way these days.

It is a new experience for us to have unlimited access to the internet. It allows us to talk to our friends around the world (besides Cuba) much easier and faster. But it's also a new experience that people rather use the net to get in touch with people than to call or meet the person directly.

You related your project to the Dunbar number. What do you think about Dunbar's hypothesis?

Anthropologist and Psychologist Robin Dunbar has the hypothesis that 150 is the amount of people we are able to keep track of. In his book he starts from Darwin's evolutionary theory and goes through several arenas, like business, military, his own friends, seeking to prove how that number became a relevant social unit. So, 150 is our cognitive limit in our relationships. He also says that our social structures have a triad base. They have a growing pattern based on a multiple of three, identifying the closest circle of friends between 3 and 5 people, the next bigger circle about 15, 50 and finally 150. A lot of the findings of Dunbar seem to be right. You cannot really keep track of more than 150



Faceloop Finale: Saturday 15 June 2013

To mark the end of their friendship investigation Celia -Yunior will turn their house into a Facebook inside out. With a friends room, event room, write on the wall opportunities, time line along the stairs, video room, and picture album room. They invite friends from in- and outside town to celebrate real friendship here there and everywhere.

people, not via facebook and not in real life. Very often we have facebook friends who are rather acquaintances (people you are involved with) than friends (people we meet, care for, spend time with).

What constitutes a friend to you? How many people would you name your "friends"?

A friend is a person you can count on in difficult times, the people who are happy when something good happens to you. People that you have accumulated experiences with, shared moments. People which you grow with, and that you can identify with. We think we have between 7 to 10 people we can call friends, good friends.

What did you find out about friendships of the people in Huntly during your investigation? What are the characteristics of friendships here?

People here in Huntly are very friendly and very nice when you meet them at home. They prepare some food and drinks and are happy to talk to you and spend time with you. But you definitely need to make an appointment beforehand, because they want to be prepared, prepare their house, prepare some food. They want to coordinate things – which is not a bad thing. In Cuba, you just come over for a chat – without paying attention to the available time of the friend you are visiting. People don't respect your private time so much there. It is different from friendship relationships in Huntly. So, maybe Dunbar's number is also a cultural characteristic.

Since a lot of people in Huntly are older they often don't use facebook to get in touch with people here in town. If they use facebook then it's just to stay in contact with people who left and are maybe living abroad. Younger people use facebook much more often. Nevertheless, they first get in touch with people face-to-face, namely at school.

In Huntly, people often meet their friends in the streets, on the square, for example at the farmer's market. They don't invite them always to their houses. They don't always visit each other, maybe as their home is their own private space.

Faceloop ends in an event bringing together your friendships findings. What are the plans?

The final event will be an open-house-event. It's almost like reversing what people have been doing with us here. They opened their houses to us, shared their time and space with us. We will use part of the facebook-structure: spaces in the house will have functions like an FB profile, there will be a wall with messages, a friends room, an events area and of course the "likes"-area. It's like trying to embody part of what we are so familiar with through electronic media. Through *faceloop* we want to show the whole process of the project, by creating an opportunity for people to connect face-to-face.




